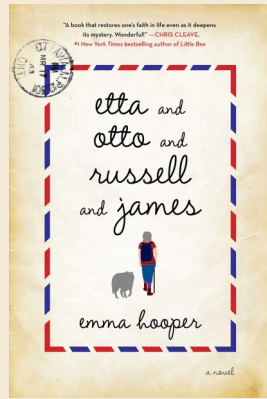

The Music of French-Canadians, Franco-Americans, Acadians and Cajuns with Lucie Therrien
